How Israel's Diaspora Ministry tracks protests abroad

What Israel's Diaspora Ministry records show about its protest monitoring, who is paid, and related influence campaigns.

Research collected by [Wallface](#).

Israel's Diaspora Ministry runs a command post that reports on protests abroad, and its procurement records name the suppliers. Separately, US filings show money for Israeli Foreign Ministry campaigns and who it was passed on to. We follow each record without merging different ministries, programmes or kinds of payment.

Read it with the five-page brief and the downloadable financial records and source list.

About this report

We start with what the forecasts show, then explain the monitoring centre, who runs it, who repeats its alerts and what parliaments have asked. Methods follow. Spending by other ministries, which is not J-SOC, comes after that in a separate Related part, then an appendix and the sources.

What we checked

For this edition we checked selected original documents and the main FARA financial pages. Figures from the Ministry's spreadsheets come from our earlier copies, because we couldn't download them again; they're labelled that way throughout. Spreadsheet figures we couldn't trace to a recoverable source are left out. This isn't a complete account of all spending or all accounts.

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What we found

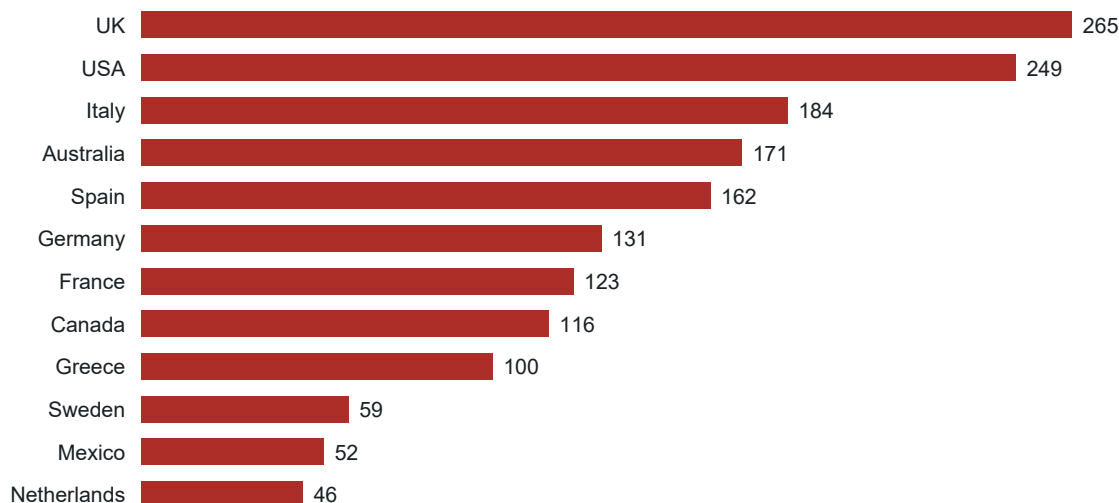
Counted from the Ministry's own forecast reports.

In the 70 J-SOC reports we collected, Israel's Diaspora Ministry lists **2,259 planned protests and events in 57 countries** between December 2024 and October 2026. The United Kingdom (265), the United States (249), Italy (184) and Australia (171) appear most; London alone comes up 97 times.

All but one listing carries the Ministry's risk rating: 1,180 low, 942 medium, 134 high and 2 extreme. In the 55 reports that print their scale, "medium" means "potential for minor violence/major disruptions" and "high" means "likely to involve violence". Detailed entries name the groups behind each event and their social-media following, and 446 give the distance to the nearest Israeli site.

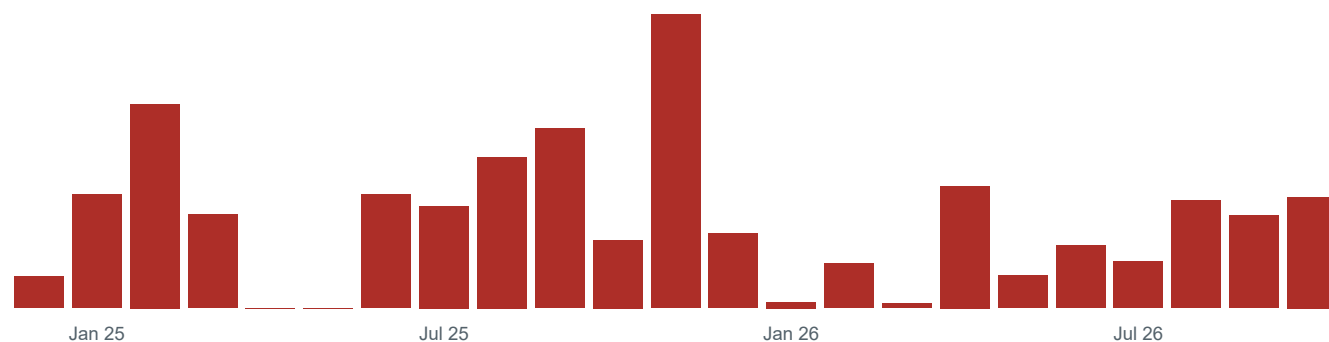

Counts leave out 77 listings from an earlier duplicate edition. A listing is a forecast, not a confirmed protest, and the same event can appear in more than one report. Risk ratings are the Ministry's. The London figure counts listings whose location mentions London.

What J-SOC monitors

A monitoring centre inside a government ministry, the protest forecasts it publishes, and the company named on the order to run it.

A government centre that monitors online activity and coordinates a response

J-SOC is the Ministry's National Center for Combating Antisemitism. The Ministry calls it a national command post, or **Mashlat**, set up to collect and analyse information and to coordinate a response with government bodies and partner organisations.

Its remit covers antisemitism and also what the Ministry calls the “**delegitimisation**” of Israel. So its published work goes beyond antisemitic attacks: it includes forecasts of protests and boycott campaigns abroad.

Output

Weekly protest forecasts. The example below lists locations, the accounts posting about each event and a risk rating, with more detail for some entries.

Stated purpose

Supporting “political, legal, educational and cognitive” activity, in the Ministry's words.

How the Ministry says it works

Watch TikTok, YouTube, Facebook, Telegram and X, starting in English, French, Arabic and Hebrew.

Log planned events and give each a risk rating. Detailed entries record location, proximity to Israeli assets and online reach.

Share the resulting picture with government bodies, national institutions and civil-society groups.

Based on the Ministry's announcement and the forecast below. Sources: S55 and S56.

Why it matters. The forecast turns protest into something a government system can track: who is posting, where an event will happen and how risky it is rated. Even potential press coverage counts toward the low-risk criteria. You can read the classification for yourself.

One week's forecast: 20 listings, 15 of them rated low risk

The forecast for **27 February–5 March 2026** has five detailed entries on pages 1–2 and 15 low-risk listings on page 3. These are events the forecast expected, not a record of protests that took place.

The detailed entries have fields for coordinates, proximity to Israeli assets, risk rating and online reach, though some are left blank. The low-risk list has far less detail.

Entries include a boycott campaign involving **Teva in Madrid**, and a Melbourne event where **Students for Palestine groups and Free Palestine Melbourne** are named as posting sources. Being named as a posting source doesn't mean a group organised the event or did anything wrong.

Page 4 sets out the rating criteria: location, proximity, a group's history, rhetoric and engagement. The report gives no weighting and no reasons for individual ratings.

The report is marked "Restricted", but the Ministry published it openly on its own website.

Risk Level Methodology

We define risk levels based on an assessment of a number of factors that may lead to potential harm to Jewish/Israeli communities/assets, such as **proximity to Israeli assets**, **location in major cities**, the **organizing group's history of violence**, the tone of **rhetoric surrounding the protest**, and **online engagement levels** (e.g., post likes).

Risk levels range from:

Low: Potential for minor disruptions/press coverage.

Medium: Potential for minor violence/major disruptions.

High: Likely to involve violence.

Very High: Likely to see significant violence causing serious injury.

The forecast index

Search every listing and trace it to the Ministry's original report and page.

2,259 listings from 70 reports

The collection has 2,336 rows taken from 70 of the Ministry's reports, and every one links to its original on gov.il. The listing count for each report matches the spreadsheet. We also checked a random sample of 100 listings against the originals and found one transcription error. This is not a count of separate protests, because the same event can appear in several reports.

Two editions of the October anniversary report overlap: 77 rows come from the earlier one and 119 from the later one. Leaving out the earlier edition gives the 2,259 listings used in our counts, which can still include a few repeats. Listings dated in the future are forecasts, not events that happened.

Every listing keeps its spreadsheet row, source filename and page number, with a link to the original report on gov.il. A few originals contain their own errors, such as a Belfast address listed under Ecuador; we copy those as printed. Risk ratings are the Ministry's, not our assessment.

We withhold the names of private individuals, shown as "individual (name withheld)". Organisations, elected officials and well-known public figures are shown as the reports list them. The Ministry's originals, linked from each listing, are unedited.

By type, the spreadsheet holds 1,143 detailed entries, 991 short low-risk entries, six special entries and 196 anniversary-table entries. Event dates run from 19 December 2024 to 14 October 2026. Where a printed date has no year, we took the year from the report's date range.

Who runs it, and what it costs

The people and the contract behind the command post. This is the only money in the records that is J-SOC's own.

A named manager, and reports that go to security bodies

In November 2024, Shlomit Hammer told a Knesset committee that she manages the monitoring centre. In January 2025, Hadas Maimon described its reports going to security bodies, ministries and partners.

Lotan is the named supplier on the order to run the monitoring centre

Lotan Group International Ltd (514236637) is the supplier on Diaspora Ministry order **4502542354**. In the Q4 2025 disclosure, the order's description translates as "operating the Mashlat". Earlier and later snapshots describe it as research services. Its recorded value is ₪**151,162.72**.

The service term ran from 10 December 2024 to 10 December 2025. Later invoices don't show whether it was renewed.

These figures come from our earlier copy of the Ministry's spreadsheets. We couldn't download fresh copies for this edition.

Who uses the alerts publicly

J-SOC's alerts don't stay inside government. Two public accounts have passed them on.

Jewish Onliner and StopAntisemites repeated J-SOC alerts

On 21 August 2025, **Jewish Onliner** published an article that linked directly to a J-SOC alert about protests planned across Australia. Its description of the 24 August rally at Sydney's Hyde Park at 1:00 PM matches the Ministry's alert and listing F27-E021 in the forecast index.

On 12 November 2024, **StopAntisemites** publicly passed on a Diaspora Ministry alert.

These show the alerts being cited and shared in public. They don't show routine access to the forecasts, payment or government direction.

Questions in parliament

Politicians in Italy and at the European Parliament have formally raised J-SOC. Here is what they asked, and what came back.

Italy: a formal Senate question names J-SOC

On **25 September 2025**, Senator **Giuseppe De Cristofaro** put written question **4-02415** to Italy's Foreign Affairs, Interior and Defence ministers. It names J-SOC and the Diaspora Ministry, raises concerns about the reporting on protests, and asks what the government knew, how rights are being protected and what diplomatic steps it will take.

The question shows the concerns were formally raised; it isn't a finding that unlawful surveillance took place. We haven't seen an Italian ministerial answer.

The European Commission replied without making a finding on J-SOC

MEP **Mimmo Lucano** tabled question **E-003735/2025** on 25 September 2025, and **Kaja Kallas** answered for the Commission on **13 November 2025**.

The answer covers member states' responsibility for internal security, the rights to free expression and assembly, and opposition to foreign interference, threats and intimidation. It doesn't confirm the monitoring, announce an investigation into J-SOC or say the activity was unlawful.

Methods, limits and corrections

What each kind of figure means, where the sources come from, and what we still don't know.

What the financial terms mean

Order value or ceiling: the maximum amount recorded or authorised. **Cumulative invoices:** the total invoiced on an order by a given reporting date. **Period invoices:** the amount reported for that period alone. **Reported receipt or disbursement:** money a filer declares it received or paid. A filing is the filer's own declaration, not an audited bank record.

We don't add successive snapshots together, or a budget to its receipts, or an approval to an earlier notice of intent. Shekel and dollar amounts are kept apart. A figure revised downward isn't proof of a refund, and a zero invoice applies only to the record and period examined.

Spreadsheet creation and edit dates tell you about the file, not necessarily when the figures took effect. Descriptions and column positions change between releases, so we match rows by purchase-order number and column heading.

For public accounts, we distinguish between posts picked for sharing, sources cited, alerts passed on, organisations' own statements and financial records. An account appearing here doesn't mean J-SOC paid, controlled or directed it. These are selected cases, not a full list of accounts or spending.

Sources, and what we could check

The source list gives each source's original web address and the page or record to look at. We include copies of selected documents, each with a SHA-256 checksum so you can confirm it hasn't been altered. An archived web page shows what was there on the day it was captured, not later versions. Organisations' statements are labelled as theirs, and reproduced documents are credited to the site that hosts them.

For this edition we rechecked the GenTruth protocol and the main FARA financial pages. We couldn't download the Ministry's spreadsheets again, so figures from our earlier copies are kept and labelled as such, rather than presented as newly checked. New spreadsheet figures from the wider research are held back until the source can be recovered and reconciled.

How the forecast index was compiled and checked is set out above, in the forecast section.

What we still don't know

We haven't found the command post's statement of work or any renewal after Lotan's service term ended; the company supplying its technology; who receives its non-public reports; why some procurement figures were restated; whether the GenTruth commitments were signed; or where money passed through intermediaries finally ended up.

Avricon, VALOP International and Yifat come up in the wider procurement research, but a label like "research services" or "media monitoring" doesn't identify the J-SOC platform. VALOP's company filings show that it exists as a company, not what any contract covers. We don't claim that any of them runs or took part in the command post.

Keshet David is an older lead on monitoring. Past similarities don't show that it runs the current command post, and newer financial claims about it need records we can access before we publish them.

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About us

WhoFundedGenocide is published by Archive Genocide. This investigation was put together by our team from public records: the Ministry's own publications, Israeli procurement disclosures, US foreign-agent (FARA) filings and parliamentary records. The forecast collection was compiled by Wallface.

Each programme in the records belongs to a named government body. Here is who is responsible for what.

Monitoring and funding programmes

Home of J-SOC. Its procurement disclosures name **Lotan, Newsrael, Kela Shlomo and Maccabi**, and a committee has approved a separate, updated **GenTruth** framework. These are separate programmes, not one J-SOC budget.

Overseas campaign engagements

Named as the government agency in the Esther Project filing by Havas and Bridges. Show Faith by Works also attributes its receipts to this ministry.

- **Havas Media Group Germany** is the intermediary named in the Bridges filing.
- **LAPAM**, the Government Advertising Agency, appears in related Havas work orders.

Influencer engagements

At a June 2025 Knesset Finance Committee hearing, **Ayelet Heller** of the Finance Ministry's budgets division said the Public Diplomacy Directorate engages influencers as part of its campaigns. At the same hearing, **Ohad Mordechai**, also of the budgets division, said the Diaspora Ministry has no influencer contracts. The two statements are about different bodies, and neither identifies J-SOC payments to any named account.

- The committee requested names and amounts.
- Heller said she didn't have the list, and that the influencers' identities were sensitive.

Related: other ministries' money

Budgets, invoices, receipts and payments are different things, so we show each one as recorded and never add them into a single total.

Mosaic United's campus partners: Hillel, Chabad and Olami

Mosaic United describes its programme as focused on Jewish identity and connection to Israel. Its partner directory lists **Hillel International**, **Chabad on Campus** and **Olami** among others, and Hillel's own published account names the same three-way campus partnership.

That establishes a stated partnership, not how much Ministry money reached any partner.

A Ministry order to Voices of Israel for promoting Israel's narrative

The spreadsheet names **Kela Shlomo**, also known as **Voices of Israel / Concert (515452316)**. Order **4502329878**, created on 22 May 2023, describes a joint project promoting Israel's narrative and combating delegitimisation.

In Q4 2024 the order shows ₪14,130,000 in value and ₪12,684,547 invoiced to date. In Q3 the figures were ₪27,830,000 and ₪24,888,229.

The files show the figures were revised down, but not why, and it isn't a documented refund. We found no onward grant or subcontract linking this order to the social-media accounts in this investigation.

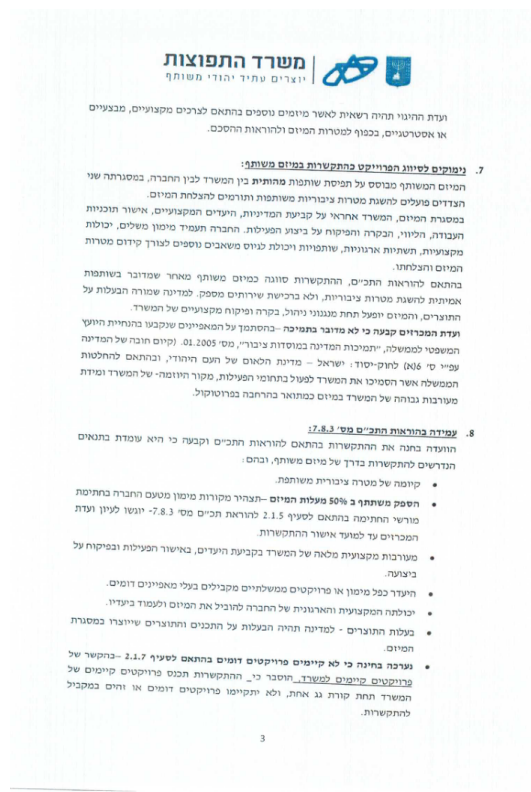
Maccabi's ILS 50m framework, and the GenTruth framework that follows it

Maccabi World Union (580037158) has an approved framework worth **ILS 50m in total**, with up to **ILS 25m from the Ministry** over three years from signature. Protocol 4496 records the approval, and its CAST call describes how projects are selected and matched. Our earlier copy of the procurement spreadsheet shows **ILS 258,864 invoiced** on order **4502548687** by Q1 2026.

A GenTruth update signed on **23 September 2026** refers to an approval on **12 August 2026** and raises the total framework to **ILS 60m**. The Ministry pays at most **ILS 30m**, and no more than half of actual costs; the partner has to cover at least half. The notice gives a planned term of December 2026–November 2028, with objections open until 12 October 2026.

Under the accompanying protocol, the Ministry sets policy and professional goals, approves the work plan and supervises. The State owns what is produced. Existing Maccabi projects continue until they end or their budget runs out, under the transition arrangements.

Approved, not yet executed. The committee approval is documented, but the protocol itself says approval is not a commitment to a supplier; that needs a signed order or agreement. We have seen no signed agreement or payment. The earlier ILS 142m proposal is not added to the new ceiling.

The Esther Project: from the Foreign Ministry, through Havas, to Bridges Partners

Foreign Ministry Represented government agency to Havas Media Group Germany Named intermediary to Bridges Partners FARA 7652 · Esther Project

Havas order 93702/0 sets a June–November 2025 campaign schedule of **\$900,000**. The original filing separately reports a **\$199,985 advance** received on 3 July 2025, and a later supplemental filing lists who was paid.

Who Bridges paid

Bridges' supplemental filing of 30 April 2026 lists 24 payments on pages 11–12. Grouped by the nine payee names, they total \$197,960, as reported by Bridges.

Clock Tower's ad schedule reached \$31.5m; Show Faith reported \$2.3m received

Clock Tower X (FARA 7649) filed a June 2026 schedule of seven monthly advertising entries at **\$4.5m each**, \$31.5m for April–October. In December 2025 its earlier \$6m budget had been replaced by a \$9m pool; how that pool relates to the later schedule isn't clear from the filings.

Show Faith by Works (FARA 7653) reported six receipts totalling **\$2,313,791.50** in its filing for the six months to 31 March 2026, dated from 27 September 2025 to 10 March 2026 and attributed to the Israeli Foreign Ministry. Its original registration dates a \$325,881 receipt to 18 September 2025 and names HAVAS Media as the payer. The September entries may be the same money, so they aren't added together.

A separate schedule lists **\$600,000 in agency fees** for **SKDKnickerbocker / Stagwell Global**: \$50,000 a month from April 2025 to March 2026.

The Exigent Foundation: one procurement, two stages

Foreign Ministry notice **4000606762**, published on 8 September 2025 and updated on 22 September, announced an intended engagement of **USD 162,600** with **The Exigent Foundation** (identifier **1001223573**) for delegations of Canadian opinion leaders.

Committee minutes dated **25 September 2025** approve Ministry participation of up to **USD 128,800** for two delegations, and require a signed agreement and expense records. The capped items they list add up to USD 129,400, which is USD 600 more than the ceiling; the minutes don't explain the gap. The minutes are available as a reproduction hosted by PressProgress, with Hebrew scans and an English translation.

These are two stages of one procurement, so the amounts aren't added, and neither shows cash paid. It is a Foreign Ministry record, not J-SOC spending.

What is Words of Iron?

Words of Iron was presented as a volunteer project that gathered pro-Israel material and organised sharing it online. It was a separate content-and-sharing initiative, not another name for J-SOC.

A CTech interview published on 12 October 2023 names its founder as **Shaked Lokits**, a Tel Aviv software engineer with a background in advertising, who set it up in the first two days after the 7 October attacks.

According to the profile, volunteers collected material, moderators reviewed it, and content briefs went out for wider distribution. It put the number of volunteers at about 500 at the time.

CTech places the project within **IsraelTechGuards**, which it describes as a joint initiative of the National Information Directorate, the Diaspora Ministry, other government offices and tech companies. That is a reported institutional link, not a contract or a payment to any social-media account.

What the homepage asked users to do

An archived copy from **14 November 2023** shows two options. The first showed users selected pro-Israel posts and gave them a ready-made comment to paste under each one, presenting more comments as a way to boost a post's reach.

The second asked users to report content it called "**false or anti-Israeli**". That is the project's own label, not a finding that the content was false or broke platform rules. The archive shows what users were asked to do, not how many reports were filed or whether anything was removed.

Why Words of Iron is in this investigation

Its archived Twitter-share feeds show which posts it picked: four by **Visegrad24** and one by **StopAntisemites**, listed below. Picking a post for others to share doesn't mean its author was paid, took part or was directed by J-SOC.

So there are two separate pieces of evidence: a reported link between the project and a government-linked initiative, and archived records of the posts it chose. Neither shows money going to the named accounts.

Where Jewish Onliner, AMCHA and StopAntisemites appear

A FactSignal article filed by Clock Tower X links to and credits **Jewish Onliner**, and its footer says it was distributed on behalf of the State of Israel. Another filed explainer cites **AMCHA**'s page on BDS. And on 12 November 2024, **StopAntisemites** publicly passed on a Diaspora Ministry alert.

These are cases of citing a source or passing on an alert. The imagery guide cited in one filing belongs to the **Antisemitism Policy Trust**, a different organisation from Campaign Against Antisemitism.

FactSignal's use of Jewish Onliner's Iran analysis in February 2026 credits Jewish Onliner and carries Clock Tower X's disclosure that it was distributed on behalf of the State of Israel. That shows source use and a disclosed distribution role. It doesn't make Jewish Onliner the registered agent, or J-SOC the client.
